Small but Special Rutledge

Amidst cotton fields and farms lies the 1871 historic city of Rutledge, GA. First a family plantation, then a bustling railroad center, Rutledge was ravaged by Sherman's troops in 1864. As the residents rebuilt their city and homes, a centralized commercial district emerged.

Over the years Rutledge residents have molded and preserved their community with a common love of its history and rural character. The railroad, part of what defines Rutledge, still runs through the heart of downtown. Blessed with a quaint park, civic groups have enhanced the city with trees, flowers, public art and activities.

While there are many activities to do and sights to see, don't miss the following Rutledge traditions: (check website for dates)

- The Rutledge Country Fair in May
- The Sunflower Farm Festival in July
- Spooky Fall Fest in October
- Christmas in the Country in November
- Music in the Park, Fridays from Memorial Day till Labor Day

Rutledge is just 3 miles from I-20 and Hard Labor Creek State Park, 9 miles from historic Madison and 6 miles from the Sunflower Farm.
