### Highlights:

For the first time, the Carter Presidential Museum devotes a major section to the work the Carters and The Carter Center have done to advance human rights since leaving the White House.

- Preventing Guinea worm and other neglected diseases
- Monitoring 76 elections worldwide
- Supporting the work of human rights defenders

Visitors will sit in actual airline seats and learn about the Carters' travels around the world to promote democracy, fight disease, improve mental health and monitor elections.


Then, at a *state-of-the-art interactive table*, they can take a virtual trip with the Carters to work on humanitarian projects. The table, with its three globes, allows up to 12 people to virtually travel around the world to observe the work of the Carters and The Carter Center.





"A Day in the Life of the President" follows President Carter through one single day (December 11, 1978) from his 5:30 a.m. wake-up call until he goes to bed at 11p.m. that night. Surrounded by six giant video screens, visitors will experience the fast pace, the numerous meetings and briefings and the tough decisions a president makes in a single day.

Visitors also can step into an *exact replica of the Oval Office*, decorated the way it was during the Carter Administration. The office includes artifacts from the Carter Oval Office (including the desk chair, globe, flag), as well as reproductions (including the famous Resolute desk).



Visitors will be able to experience what it is like to do research in the *Carter Library archives*. Three touch-screen stations in front of the library stacks allow visitors to virtually pull out a document box related to one of several key Carter Presidency topics and then see copies of source documents, the way researchers do.



- One of 13 Presidential Libraries managed by the National Archives and Records Administration
- The only Presidential Library in the Southeast
- Original construction began in October 1984 and was completed October 1986.
- Private funds were raised for the entire original \$26 million complex (including both the Library and Museum and the not-for-profit Carter Center).
- Original architects: Jova/Daniels/Busby of Atlanta and Lawton, Umemura & Yamamoto of Honolulu
- The Library and Museum are approximately 69,750 square feet, including approximately 24,000 square feet of exhibit space.
- Archive for more than 27 million pages of Presidential Papers
- ½ million photographs and hundreds of hours of film, audio and videotape
- Researchers come from around the world to look at original source documents for books, articles and papers.
