



Country music star Alan Jackson’s song catalog is full of remembrances of his childhood in **Newnan**, where many of his family members still reside. Alan graduated from **Newnan High School**. He met his wife, author Denise Jackson, at the **Dairy Queen** just a few blocks from historic downtown **Newnan**.


Jackson’s first band, Dixie Steel (named for a brand of nails) performed throughout **Coweta County** before Alan’s big break in 1989.



Margaret Anne Barnes’ true-life tale of this notorious Southern trial recounts how the testimony of a black man led to the conviction of a powerful white man who was sentenced to death for murder. This landmark trial took place in the **1904 Coweta County Courthouse**. The book was made into a movie starring Johnny Cash and Andy Griffith.



Lewis Grizzard

When Lewis was young he and his mother moved in with her parents in **Moreland** where he would spend his childhood. Grizzard would recount his often frustrating relationship with his father in *My Daddy Was a Pistol and I'm a Son of a Gun*. He began his writing early, publishing stories of his little league team in the **Newnan Times Herald**. He made **Sprayberry's Barbecue** (229 Jackson Street and Hwy. 34 at I-85, exit 47) famous through his newspaper columns. His favorite combo was a sliced pork sandwich, stew and onion rings—listed on the menu as the Lewis Grizzard Special.



Erskine Caldwell

Born in **Moreland**, he carried the earliest sense of place into his literature. One of the best selling writers of the early 20th century, a compatriot of Faulkner, Steinbeck, Fitzgerald and Salinger, his *Tobacco Road* and *God's Little Acre* have been admired—and sometimes reviled—for the hard-hitting realism of his frank depictions of the poverty stricken South in the early 20th century.



Hetty Jane Dunaway

Walt Disney came to Dunaway Gardens to catch the act of this 1920s stage actress, Hetty Jane. She was a new bride in the 1920s when her husband announced he decided to move the couple from Atlanta to his community home of **Roscoe**. Hetty promptly shook her head and said, “I’m not living down here!” However, on the promise that she could create whatever she wanted on their land, she agreed to make the move. She and her husband spent the rest of their days entertaining celebrities like Walt Disney and Minnie Pearl at **Dunaway Gardens**.





Keith Brooking






Oak Hill Cemetery

Coweta County was once part of the Creek Nation, named for the tribe headed by Chief William McIntosh, who relinquished lands to the federal government in the 1825 Treaty of Indian Springs. McIntosh was slain by an irate group of fellow Creeks at his home

on the **Chattahoochee River**. Legend has it that McIntosh received gold in exchange for the lands. The gold was supposedly buried but was never found.

By 1840, the beginning of the golden era in the South, orderly streets lined with mansions and cottages reflected the growing prosperity—the railroads brought even greater fortune.

The Civil War caused a slowing in growth as sawmills fell silent, the railroads became part of the war effort and cotton production severely diminished. Confederate General Joe Wheeler routed brigades of Union troops in the July 1864 **Battle of Brown's Mill**, located southwest of **Newnan**. Local churches, private homes, College Temple and the courthouse were turned into makeshift hospitals with wounded from both armies being treated.

By the 20th Century a boom in growth began and continues today.

Downtown Newnan


ewnan is known as the City of Homes. We invite you to explore our historic downtown.

Newnan

The **City of Newnan** was incorporated in 1828. It is named for General Daniel Newnan, a North Carolina native who was a soldier and later became Georgia Secretary of State and a United States Congressman.

During the Civil War, **Newnan** was a hospital town for both the Blue and the Gray. At one time

10,000 soldiers were being hospitalized throughout the city.

Tours

A **self-guided driving tour brochure** is available at the **Visitors Center**. The tour will take you past homes representing the antebellum and Victorian styles featuring towers, balconies dripping with gingerbread trim, bay windows, wrap-around porches, and stained and leaded glass windows. A **guided tour** can also be arranged at the local **Visitors Center**.

Movie Backdrop

Downtown has become a popular location for movies including made-for-TV hits *October Road*, *Murder in Coweta County*, and feature films *Driving Miss Daisy*, *Fried Green Tomatoes* and *Sweet Home Alabama*.



Historic Downtown

You will find a vibrant town square full of shops, restaurants, and places to sit down and enjoy the day. Brick-lined sidewalks and ornate streetlamps, accented by beautiful landscaping, make the downtown area extremely pedestrian friendly. More shops and restaurants are within easy walking distance in the nine blocks of National Register - listed commercial district that radiate from the **Courthouse Square**.


Two houses in the downtown **Newnan** shopping district have received the *Excellence in Restoration Award* from the Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation.

Old Town Sharpsburg

Old Town Sharpsburg

Highway 16/54

Founded in 1825 and incorporated in 1871, **Sharpsburg** was named for a judge—Elias Sharp who owned one of the first homes. **Sharpsburg** was a thriving small town up until the early 1900s with cotton gins, warehouses, a drug store, a bank, a blacksmith shop, a general store, and a post office. The Depression in the '20s began the decline in both business and population. Today, this historic town still reflects the past. Stroll through the Old Town and shop for gifts and antiques. A treasure awaits you!

Turin

Highway 16 East

Legend has it that **Turin** was named for Turin, Italy. This area is known for agriculture, beginning in the 1800s with cotton being king. **Turin** remains true to its agriculture heritage. There is an annual tractor pull and festival every summer.

Senobia

Highway 16 & 85

Legend has **Senobia** named for Chief William McIntosh's mother, Senoya He-ne-ha. McIntosh ceded the land to the state in the early 1800s. **Senobia** developed from a cluster of farms into an 1827 railroad community. With its collection of architectural treasures, most of the town comprises a historic district listed on the National Register of Historic Places, with 150 Greek Revival, antebellum, and Victorian structures and homes. **Senobia** was the setting for movies such as *Fried Green Tomatoes*, *Mama Flora's Family* and *The War*. There is a driving tour brochure of **Senobia** available at the **Visitors Center**.




Haralson, Georgia

Highway 85 South

The city is in the deep southeast part of the county. Settlers began coming into the area around 1825 and 1827. Cotton was king until the boll weevil took its toll.

Incorporated in 1852 this community was named for Col. L.P. Grant, railroad engineer. This city has a historic district with buildings remaining from two cotton mills and a mill village, along with several historic churches and a passenger freight depot.



Floral Gardens

Moreland

Highway 29 South

Established in 1888, this once booming farming and industrial community now houses three museums.

Various styles of architecture reflect the prosperity of the area. You will find Erskine Caldwell's birth home—**The Little Manse, Lewis Grizzard Museum, 1876 Moreland Post Office, 1894 Old Knitting Mill** and **Founders Cemetery**.

Roscoe


Highway 70

A small crossroads community surrounded by outlying farms and overlooked by a quaint church on a hill, **Roscoe's** architectural styles are of the 19th and 20th century farmhouses, including shotgun-style houses with the center hallway running the length of the house. **Roscoe** is home to **Dunaway Gardens**.

Dedicated to preservation and conservation of the cultural, historical and architectural African-American heritage of **Coweta County**, the Alliance operates the **Coweta County Heritage Museum and Research Center** and serves as a genealogy workroom for records, research and artifacts. The museum is housed in a restored shotgun-style house, and is adjacent to the **Farmer Street Cemetery** which is thought to be the largest slave cemetery in the South.



Coweta County Courthouse

200 Court Square, Newnan

This 1904 Classical architecture reflects both the Italian influence of architect Andrea Palladio in its central crossing plan and English architect Christopher Wren in its symmetrical classicism. Traditionally cornices and pediments are of stone, but stamped and formed copper was used. The most interesting feature is the dome, reminiscent of the famed Gibbs Radcliff Library. Rising more than 100 feet above the Court Square, it features clocks on all four sides. The dome is covered with copper to match the cornice, pediment and railings. The architect was James Golucke, the son of a German immigrant who settled in Georgia.





The final resting place of soldiers who did not survive the Civil War.

In the Confederate section there are 269 graves of soldiers who died here in 1863 and 1864 when Newnan was a hospital town. Due to the good records of the hospitals, only two soldiers are unknown. Every state in the Confederacy is represented in these burials. Also here are graves of Revolutionary War soldiers. Many notables are buried here including two governors of Georgia, Ellis Arnall and William Atkinson.



You will definitely want to see the **Zellers Memorial** site. The downtown area has a **restored Depot** and historic homes abound. One of the earliest homes of Coweta County is found in Grantville—a circa-1830 pioneer cabin that sits in **Grantville Park**.



The Battle of Brown's Mill

3 miles South of Newnan

On July 27, 1864, Brig. Gen. E.M. McCook with 3,600 Federal cavalry began a raid to destroy railroads south of Atlanta and release 32,000 Federal prisoners at Andersonville. July 30, Maj. Gen. Joseph Wheeler, with 1,400 Confederate cavalry caught and routed the Federals, captured about 2,000 men, several ambulances, a full battery and released 500 Confederate prisoners. Here General Wheeler whipped the pick of the Federal cavalry and saved **Newnan** from capture and possible destruction, indicated by a historical marker at the Courthouse.

The Plantation is on the National Register of Historic Places. Circa 1835, this house is a Federal Vernacular, four-over-four, central hallway with a full third-story attic. In addition to the Arnold family cemetery, which lies approximately 40 yards from the house, there are numerous garden areas on the premises. A gazebo made with columns that once held up the back stoop of the house is adjacent to the romantic perennial garden. There are four themed gardens over 20 acres: the herb garden, pool garden, patience garden and vegetable garden adjoin the site of the sunken garden.




Established in the 1920s, this stunning 25-acre floral rock garden fell into a dilapidated state for many decades, its beauty choked by a tangle of vines and the passage of time. Today, the original five descending terraces feature rock walls, slate patios, waterfalls, goldfish ponds, hanging gardens and a one-acre granite outcrop known as Little Stone Mountain have been uncovered. **Dunaway Gardens** was a theatrical training ground for producers, directors and performers of the arts during the golden years of the '20s, '30s and '40s. Hetty Jane Dunaway was a talented vivacious actress from Arkansas, who

rose to fame as one of the most celebrated artists on the Chautauqua Circuit. She was the creator of the theatrical training center and floral rock gardens that bear her name. These Gardens have played host to ballet troupes, indoor and outdoor theater, as well as Walt and Roy Disney and Minnie Pearl.
